# Safe Drive Stay Alive Greater Manchester

# EVALUATION REPORT 2014





Becoming a casualty in a road traffic collision continues to be one of the biggest risks for young people. New and inexperienced drivers are often those who sadly lose their lives, or suffer life changing injuries as a result of taking unnecessary risks behind the wheel, or as passengers in their friend's cars.

The emergency services across Greater Manchester have come together to change this, and to ensure that our young people know the risks, enjoy learning to drive safely, and do not become one of our statistics.

Safe Drive Stay Alive is a partnership project between Greater Manchester Police (GMP),

Greater Manchester Fire and Rescue Service (GMFRS), North West Ambulance Service (NWAS) and Salford Royal NHS Foundation Trust (SRFT).

This project provides the opportunity for young people to attend an emotionally engaging half day performance which is delivered in partnership between all emergency services.

Performances are based around a series of short and emotive films, and live speakers from each of the emergency services.

It also includes presentations from members of families whose lives have been affected by a serious road traffic collision.

Funding was secured through the Greater Manchester Casualty Reduction Partnership, meaning that we were able to offer all Greater Manchester post - 16 colleges the opportunity to attend a performance



completely free of charge.

This evaluation report summarises the outcomes following delivery of Safe Drive Stay Alive in 2014.



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# AIMS & OBJECTIVES OF THE PROJECT

# AIM

To reduce the number of young people (16 – 25) who are killed or injured on the roads of Greater Manchester.

## OBJECTIVES

Through attendance at Safe Drive Stay Alive young people will be able to:

- Understand the risks which may lead to becoming a road casualty
- Understand the consequences and impact of risk taking on the roads
- Make a pledge about how they will keep themselves safe as road users
- Challenge unsafe attitudes and behaviour on the roads amongst their peers

## WHO ATTENDED?

All Greater Manchester 6th form and further education colleges were invited to attend the performances via email and a follow-up telephone call to encourage them to sign up. Our main sports clubs were also contacted to encourage them to book places for their youth / academy players.

Around a third of all Greater Manchester colleges booked places to attend a performance.









### VENUE - MIDDLETON ARENA

Several possible venues were visited and considered and the Middleton Arena met our required criteria. It proved to be an excellent venue on all fronts and the staff were extremely accommodating, during the delivery phase becoming an integral part of our Project Team. College tutors and students expressed that the performance had much more impact as it was professionally delivered with effective lighting and sound equipment. The Middleton Arena has already been provisionally booked for our 2015 performances.

### STUDENT WELFARE DURING PERFORMANCES

Due to the emotive nature of the presentation, student welfare was carefully considered and safeguards agreed and put in place. A full risk assessment was provided to every college on making a booking. Colleges were required to let the planning team know prior to attendance of any students who may have any welfare or accessibility issues. We had qualified paramedics and nursing staff present in the audience at all performances, and any health or welfare issues were sensitively managed.

The social media activity following attendance is summarised in this report, and it did suggest that students were, by large, emotionally moved by the performances, but felt able to discuss their feelings with their peers, families and tutors.

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### TRANSPORT EVALUATION

Belle Vue Coaches managed our transport plan for the project, as they were able to utilise their Big Yellow School Buses at a reduced rate out of the school run times. They also have good relationships and knowledge of many of the colleges across Greater Manchester, and this was a great assistance in helping the transport plans run smoothly. We were also keen to identify a company whose vehicles were all fully fitted with seatbelts.

All students arrived on time for every performance, and colleges have praised the smooth planning and delivery of transport plans. Colleges have expressed appreciation of being kept well informed of plans prior to the day they were attending.

Due to the timings of the afternoon sessions, it was necessary for some students to be allowed to eat their lunches on the coaches, and this was also facilitated. In the future, we will amend the performance times slightly to allow colleges more time to complete morning lessons if they are attending in the afternoon.

Overall, it was essential to work closely with the transport company and to award management of the plans to one single company. This worked very well, and the Project Team will repeat this process in the future. Colleges did comment that the offer of free transport was important to them, so this is something we will continue to offer in the future.





### MEDIA COVERAGE

An embargoed media opportunity took place at the dress rehearsal a week prior to the launch in order to minimise disruption and to enable the media to build their packages in advance so they would have something to run on their breakfast bulletins on launch day.

Coverage was secured in most local and regional media, including Granada Reports, BBC Radio Manchester, Key 103, Global Radio Group (Capital, XFM, Smooth & Heart Radio) Manchester Evening News and Rochdale Online amongst others.

All media coverage was positive and supportive of the project and included all key messages. It was the top story on all regional radio bulletins.


### PRE AND POST EVENT SURVEY RESULTS

All attending colleges were asked to encourage students to complete a short online survey before attending the performance, and again around three weeks after attending the performance.

We had 747 responses to the pre attendance survey and 301 responses to the post attendance survey.

While the results only indicated a slight change in attitude, every question did indicate that the change had been a positive one.





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




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### STICKY WALL EXERCISE

Immediately after four of our performances, students were asked to write down a word or short phrase which they thought reflected their perception of the performance. These were then stuck onto a sticky wall, so that everyone could see a snapshot of thoughts and feelings. The word cloud below has been generated from this feedback.



### SOCIAL MEDIA RESPONSES

Students were encouraged to tweet their thoughts following each performance using the hashtag **#SafeDriveGM** 

They were also encouraged to follow us on Twitter @SafeDriveGM which enables the Project Team to then keep some contact with students, and to reinforce the learning points from the performance via social media.
